

"Imagine Your Story."



Research¹ has shown that the skills your child needs to be successful in the future are social and emotional skills!

The more socially skilled children are, the more likely they are to succeed in school. Because this is so important for your child, we are using the Pyramid Model in our program.

What is the Pyramid Model?

The Pyramid Model is a framework for supporting the social and emotional development of our children. The goal of the Pyramid Model is to create an environment where every child feels good about coming to school. This is accomplished by designing classrooms that promote engagement in learning and by building positive relationships among children, families, and staff. In our use of the Pyramid Model, our classroom staff will work together to ensure that all children understand behavior expectations, receive instruction in social skills, and those who are struggling receive individual support.

The Pyramid Model illustrates that the foundation for helping children develop social and emotional skills is nurturing and responsive relationships and high quality environments. The middle of the Pyramid, teaching of social and emotional skills, is provided to all children with some children receiving additional teaching and support. The top of the Pyramid shows that a few children will need the foundation, the middle AND individualized intervention to address challenging behavior.

To use the Pyramid Model, our program established a leadership team that will provide ongoing support to our staff and families. Our leadership team looks forward to sharing some of the important work we are doing, including teaching program-wide expectations, partnering with families, training staff in teaching strategies, providing classroom coaching to help teachers implement, and using data for decision-making. Stay tuned for ongoing updates about the Pyramid Model in our program!

What is gained by using the Pyramid Model?

FAMILIES

- Receive information on how to help promote children's social and emotional skills
- Team with teachers to help children grow and learn
- Receive support for preventing and addressing behavior problems

TEACHERS


- Are effective in helping children learn social and emotional skills
- Strengthen classroom management skills
- Have information and resources to support families




Backpack Connection Series

About this Series

The Backpack Connection Series was created by TACSEI to provide a way for teachers and parents/caregivers to work together to help young children develop social emotional skills and reduce challenging behavior. Teachers may choose to send a handout home in each child's backpack when a new strategy or skill is introduced to the class. Each Backpack Connection handout provides information that helps parents stay informed about what their child is learning at school and specific ideas on how to use the strategy or skill at home.

The Pyramid Model



The Pyramid Model is a framework that provides programs with guidance on how to promote social emotional compe-

tence in all children and design effective interventions that support young children who might have persistent challenging behavior. It also provides practices to ensure that children with social emotional delays receive intentional teaching. Programs that implement the Pyramid Model are eager to work together with families to meet every child's individualized learning and support needs. How to Help Your Child Have a Successful Morning

Do you struggle with stressful mornings when you want to lay your head down and cry before 8:00 a.m.? Do you often leave the house in an angry, frantic rush? Mornings can be a particularly challenging time for parents. Getting your entire family up and out the door is no easy task! It is important to understand that your morning routine serves as the foundation for your family's entire day. You can create a morning routine that not only helps your day to begin more smoothly, but also teaches your child important skills that he needs to become more independent and confident. A morning routine can also reduce challenging behavior such as crying, whining and tantrums.



🛅 Try This at Home

- Use a visual schedule with items such as photos, clipart, or objects that shows your child the steps in his morning routine. This visual schedule can help him to understand the expectations of the morning routine. To learn more about how to create a visual schedule, go to challengingbehavior.org and search the site for "visual schedules" in the search box located in the upper right-hand corner of the screen.
- If your child has trouble waking up in the morning, it might be because he is not getting enough sleep at night. Set a consistent bedtime and stick with it. When a child's bedtime changes it can make it harder for him to wake up in the morning. For more information on bedtime routines, go to challengingbehavior. org and search the site for "bedtime routines" in the search box located in the upper righthand corner of the screen.
- Plan ahead. Use your bedtime routine to plan for the next day together.
 - 1. Lay out the clothes your child will wear.
 - 2. Pack his backpack.
 - 3. Discuss the morning routine, show him pictures and talk about the day ahead.
- Give your child some power over his morning routine by offering reasonable choices. For example, "First, get dressed. Then, you get a choice! Would you like to have cereal or pancakes for breakfast?'
- Include bonding time in your morning routine. Time to read, bathe or snuggle will help your child feel loved and calm as he begins his tasks for the day.

Encourage your child. When your child completes a task and follows the routine, provide positive and specific encouragement. For example, say "Wow! You got up and got dressed all by yourself! Now we will have a few extra minutes to play with trains. What a great way to start the day!"

Practice at School

Teachers use routines to provide a predictable structure to your child's day. When a child understands what she should be doing and what will come next, she feels less anxiety and more excited to participate. While the specific activities in the classroom might change, the routine does not. For example, while 10:00 may always be art time, the specific craft (painting, cutting, gluing) may vary from day to day. Children become eager to try new activities because they are confident and comfortable with the routine.

The Bottom Line

A morning routine is a daily opportunity for you to build and nurture a positive relationship with your child. When you follow a repetitive morning routine you allow your child to gain practice with important skills such as dressing, bathing and grooming and give him a feeling of confidence and success. A calm, loving morning routine at home sets the tone for the entire day for both you and your child.

Lewiston Consolidated Schools School Board Meeting Minutes August 16, 2021

A regular meeting of the District 69 Board of Education, Pawnee County, was held on Monday, August 16th, at 7:00 p.m., the meeting being open to the public and proceeded in notice as required by law. Notice of this meeting was given to the President and all members of the Board and a copy of the acknowledgement of notice and the agenda is noted in the minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated to the public in advanced notice and to the President of the Board and all Board members.

The meeting was called to order, the Open Meetings Law poster recognized, and verbal notice that the meeting was recorded was given by the President and on a roll call vote, the following members were present: Bredemeier, Rule, Schuster, Searcey, Thomas, and Wehrbein. Excused Absence: none. Also present: Rick Kentfield, Juli Smith, Greg Iverson, Linda Thomas, and visitors.

The agenda was reviewed. Moved by Schuster and seconded by Thomas "to approve the agenda as presented." Those voting in favor of said motion: Bredemeier, Rule, Schuster, Searcey, Thomas, and Wehrbein. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 6-0. Visitors were welcomed. Steve Knoche, Lewiston Consolidated Schools Foundation President, requested an update of the new Vo-Ag building project and provided information on the possibility of submitting another NET Grant in the future.

Nick Thomas, School Board member, announced his resignation from the school board, effective immediately. Aaron Rule, President and other members of the school board thanked him or his service on the board.

Moved by Wehrbein and seconded by Bredemeier "to approve the minutes of the July 15, 2021, regular school board meeting." Those voting in favor of said motion: Rule, Schuster, Searcey, Wehrbein and Bredemeier. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

The treasurer's report was presented by Dennis Schuster, and Rick Kentfield presented the monthly claims, payroll, and transfers. Discussion was held. Moved by Searcey and seconded by Bredemeier "to approve the August treasurer's report, August payroll and claims as presented in the amount of \$243,212.36 and the transfer of \$25,000.00 from the General Fund to the Depreciation Fund." Those voting in favor of said motion: Schuster, Searcey, Wehrbein, Bredemeier, and Rule. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Moved by Wehrbein and seconded by Schuster "to approve the Rebecca Janssen's resignation as presented". Those voting in favor of said motion: Searcey, Wehrbein, Bredemeier, Rule, and Schuster. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Moved by Wehrbein and seconded by Searcey "to approve Shannon Burgett's resignation as presented." Those voting in favor of said motion: Wehrbein, Bredemeier, Rule, Schuster, and Searcey. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Moved by Searcey and seconded by Wehrbein "to approve Stacey Sisco's employment agreement as presented." Those voting in favor of said motion: Wehrbein, Bredemeier, Rule, Schuster, and Searcey. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Moved by Wehrbein and seconded by Bredemeier "to approve Shannon Burgett's employment agreement as presented." Those voting in favor of said motion: Bredemeier, Rule, Schuster, Searcey, and Wehrbein. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Moved by Wehrbein and seconded by Searcey "to approve Jamie Jones employment agreement as presented." Those voting in favor of said motion: Rule, Schuster, Searcey, Wehrbein, and Bredemeier. Those opposed: none. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0

Discussion was held regarding extra-curricular activities. Greg Iverson, Athletic Director, reported on boy and girl participation numbers for the 2021-22 school year. Due to low participation numbers in football and the fact that the district must declare its intentions by November 1, 2021 for the next two-year cycle, the board scheduled a workshop on September 1, 2021 at 7:30 pm to hear input from students, parents, and patrons regarding football programming. Discussion was not held regarding any other extra-curricular programming. Correspondence received from Pawnee City Public Schools and Sterling Public Schools regarding their level of interest in discussing the possibility of sharing of an extra-curricular activity in the future options was reviewed.

Mr. Kentfield, Superintendent, updated the board on facility projects including the progress on the track, elementary boy's restroom remodel, gym floor refinishing, HVAC units and humidity.

Mr. Kentfield reported on the Superintendent's goals for 2020-2021 and 2021-2022.

Juli Smith, Principal, shared information on the Open House and the start of the new school year. Pandora Worthey, PreK-4 Teacher, gave a presentation on the MTSS process for effective learning for early childhood.

Rick Kentfield, Superintendent, reported on COVID protocols for 2021-2022, free breakfast and lunches through the federal lunch program, ESSER III funds, ALICAP dividend, Health Education Standards update, student member of the school board policy, proposed budget adoption timelines, and superintendent evaluation instruments. Discussion was held regarding the vacant school board member position. The topic was tabled for further discussion at the September board meeting.

Greg Iverson, Activity Director, shared fall sports numbers and updates.

Board Committee report – No report at this time.

Moved by Searcey and seconded by Bredemeier "to adjourn at 9:07 p.m." Those voting in favor of said motion: Schuster, Searcey, Wehrbein, Bredemeier, and Rule. Those opposed: none. Motion carried, 5-0.

Next regular school board meeting will be Wednesday, September 15th, at 7:00 p.m.

The cooler evenings and days getting dark earlier means that Fall is not far off. School is off to a good start. Classes in the "Corner Room" are settling into a somewhat normal routine. The days seem to go by fast. It must be because everyone is interested in learning and giving it their best.

The days begin with the Problem Based Learning (PBL) class. The students are coming up with individual projects that test their knowledge and require new skills. They are working on designing pillows for the kindergarteners and making some baby items.

The Textile class has three different skill levels. This means those that have sewn longer are being challenged with more difficult projects. It is so rewarding to see a student's face light up when a new skill is learned. The two Embroidery students are ready to being taking orders and designing items. They completed a 4-week training course in the Melco Design. I feel more confident in their skills from this point on.

The 7th Grade class is working though careers that might be available to them. They completed a unit on Art and AV careers following a unit on Food Preparation. They considered the Foods unit too short. If there is time at the end of the 9-week course, we will be exploring more food items.

Seniors are using a layered curriculum approach in Senior Skills this year. They have choices of how to approach each unit. Units completed include a short Google App review, a Time Management unit, and a unit of writing essays explaining what success means. They are also completing rough drafts of the essays needed for the Lewiston Scholarships offered next spring.

Quick and Easy Foods class has six students learning the ins and out of quick food preparation. A variety of abilities in the kitchen makes this an interesting class every day. They have completed their basic kitchen skills and are beginning simple lunch food preparation.

The Foods class that follows Quick and Easy Foods has one student who can experiment with a variety of foods. This class is enjoyable because he is being challenged to try new foods and new methods of food preparation.

The final class of the day offers the students a wide range of FACS activities. They completed a food unit and a smattering of design challenges. They are hard workers and challenge me to prepare lessons to meet their new skills.
